2001 Annual Report

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History of the Academy

In October 1986, the Hong Kong Government established a Working Party on Postgraduate Medical Education and Training under the Chairmanship of Dr. Keith Halnan. The Report of the Working Party, which was published in October 1988, recommended that:

“there should be a “Hong Kong Academy of Medicine” composed of Fellows accredited after completion of approved training and prescribed examinations.”

In February 1990, the Hong Kong Government established the Hong Kong Academy of Medicine Preparatory Committee. Prof. Sir David Todd was appointed the Chairman.

The Preparatory Committee completed drafting the legislation and submitted it to the Executive and Legislative Councils in December 1991. The Hong Kong Academy of Medicine Ordinance (Cap. 419) was passed by the Legislative Council on 25 June 1992 and came to effect on 1 August 1992. The Government appointed an Interim Council, comprising six Office-Bearers and the Presidents of 12 designated colleges. Prof. Sir David Todd was appointed President of the Interim Council.

An Inauguration Ceremony was held on 9 December 1993 during which over 2,000 Fellows were admitted according to the admission criteria set by the Interim Council. The interim period officially ended on 19 July 1994 when the first annual general meeting was held. Prof. Sir David Todd was elected the first President of the Academy. Dr. C.H. Leong was elected Vice-President (General Affairs) and Prof. Ma Ho-kei was elected Vice-President (Education and Examinations). Dr. David Fang became the Honorary Secretary and Dr. Natalis Yuen the Honorary Treasurer. Prof. Joseph Lee took up the post of Editor for the Academy.

Since its establishment, the Academy has admitted over 3,500 Fellows under its 15 specialty Colleges, namely the Hong Kong College of Anaesthesiologists, Hong Kong College of Community Medicine, College of Dental Surgeons of Hong Kong, Hong Kong College of Emergency Medicine, Hong Kong College of Family Physicians (originally known as General Practitioners), Hong Kong College of Obstetricians and Gynaecologists, College of Ophthalmologists of Hong Kong, Hong Kong College of Orthopaedic Surgeons, Hong Kong College of Otorhinolaryngologists, Hong Kong College of Paediatricians, Hong Kong College of Pathologists, Hong Kong College of Physicians, Hong Kong College of Psychiatrists, Hong Kong College of Radiologists, and College of Surgeons of Hong Kong.

The Academy Colleges are now all housed under the Hong Kong Academy of Medicine Jockey Club Building in Wong Chuk Hang, Aberdeen. Named after its major donor, the 10-storey headquarters was officially opened on 26 November 1998, coinciding with the opening of the Academy's First International Congress. It is custom-designed to provide a modern conference and exhibition venue to the medical profession to facilitate continuing medical training, education and exchanges. The building also creates a perfect platform for Fellows and medical practitioners to meet and gather.

Objectives

The Academy constitution consists of the HKAM Ordinance (Cap. 419), Regulation and Bylaws. The Ordinance covers the objectives of the Academy, composition and powers, and the admission of Colleges and Fellows. The Regulation is a subsidiary legislation on the conduct of general meetings, Council election procedures and regulations governing the Colleges. The Bylaws cover admission criteria for Fellows, termination of membership, subscriptions and duties of the Office-Bearers.

According to the Ordinance, the objects of the Academy shall be:-

- (a) to promote the advancement of the art and science of medicine;
- (b) to foster the development of:
 - (i) postgraduate medical education and continuing medical education;
 - (ii) the study and practice of medicine and its specialties; and
 - (iii) medical research;
- (c) to promote:
 - (i) the integrity of the medical profession;
 - (ii) ethical conduct in the practice of medicine and its specialties; and
 - (iii) the improvement of the standards of such practice through training programmes approved by the Academy;
- (d) to promote the improvement of health care for Hong Kong citizens;
- (e) to foster a spirit of co-operation among medical practitioners; and
- (f) to facilitate the exchange of information and ideas in relation to all aspects of the art and science of medicine and matters connected with the medical profession.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT AND MESSAGE



Since I was given the honour to take up the helm of this great institution, I have been doing my best to attend as many international meetings as possible representing the Academy.

I was struck by our uniqueness – unique in that our Academy is the only body round the world that is established by statute. An umbrella body for 15 Academy Colleges. We are unique in having our own purpose-built home.

We are unique in being able to establish within a short span of 10 years, training standards for 15 Colleges, mounting examinations for specialist recognition. As of 1st September this year, we have 3,612 Fellows within 54 specialties, all of internationally recognized standards.

We are unique in successfully completed our first round of three-year Continuing Medical Education (CME) cycle with 96% compliance, albeit with initial stiff opposition. We are unique in initiating the first international website which hopefully one day will be the nerve centre for international CME/CPD, for coordination of training programmes, and for global facilitation of medical brotherhood. Many well-established postgraduate medical institutions are viewing us with envy, whilst up and coming ones consider us as their role model that may well be beyond their reach.

Yes, the Academy has done me proud.

These are legacies from the efforts and visions of our forefathers and our many generous donors; from the respect and support by many overseas specialist colleges; and from the friendship our local colleges have over decades cultivated. Yet, to maintain grid position in the medical world requires more than living in past laurel. The Academy must push forward. Let me say the next step would be more difficult, more demanding, more nerve-racking.

It is on this basis that your Council has decided to take three bold steps forward, some of which we have already begun:-

- (1) *Establish an infrastructure to strengthen the support for different Colleges in developing an interactive CME/CPD programme through a common base website, and to further develop the Academy building for nurturing brotherhood.*

Membership and Learning Management System

As a start, we will develop a Membership and Learning Management System (MLMS) where CME programmes could be introduced by the different Colleges in the Academy's website. Respective Fellows could also interact via the web and thus gain the necessary CME accreditations. Registration of CME accredited programmes, such as workshops and lectures, will be done through an "electronic reader" on the production of a Fellow's personalized "smart card". It is hoped that this will eventually be linked to accredited overseas CME programmes.

Needless to say, included in the pipeline will be taped significant lectures from various Colleges for Fellows to revisit.

All these, in the basic package, the Academy plans to provide, at no charge to either the Colleges or our Fellows.

It will be an expensive undertaking. Yet this is the least the Academy could and should provide within the ambit of our defined role.

A tendering exercise is now in progress conducted by a special task force consisting of mainly our Fellows with Information Technology professional know-how. Hopefully this endeavour could be implemented in a few months' time.

Library and Other Facilities

Discussions are now in the final stage to develop the third floor of the HKAM Jockey Club Building into a library, a members' lounge with recreational facilities and an exhibition hall. No educational institution is complete without an up-to-date library. It is the Academy's intention, therefore, to have such a setup that will serve as an electronic library with proper IT

and intranet connections, and at the same time, a collection of archives of medicine. In fact, an array of archives and medical literatures of nostalgia donated by senior Fellows are already in the Academy's possession.

Ample facilities will be available for our members to relax in a harmonious setting to nurture the spirit of medical and dental friendship. For the health conscious, an exercise room with the necessary amenities will be available.

To benefit all in the medical and dental professions, the Academy aims to extend these facilities to those who are not yet our members.

Your Council looks forward to seeing a more user-friendly HKAM Jockey Club Building that is proudly our own!

(II) Drive for professional excellence

As the bastion of medical standards, the Academy has unwaveringly pushed for mandatory CME. This of course, is only the first step. To be more publicly accountable, the Academy is pushing for quality assurance. As it is, Colleges are encouraged to establish specific clinical guidelines for activities in specialties within their ambit. Many have already begun. There are now clinical guidelines, for example, to determine competency in endoscopic investigations of the GI tract established under the College of Physicians. There are also guidelines for the standards of Haemodialysis Units. These requirements should never be considered as a tool to ring fence us, but rather as a witness to our years for professional competency and our commitments to the public we serve.

An international recognized medical journal is synonymous with the status of the educational institution that publishes it. The *Hong Kong Medical Journal* (HKMJ) is growing from strength to strength. High quality articles are increasingly flowing in. The Editorial Board has decided that as from 2002, the

HKMJ will be a bimonthly publication with regular sections devoting to the different specialties, one at a time and from time to time.

(III) Active participation in shaping the health and healthy care of the society.

Striving for high medical standards is the way forward for both health and healthy care. With over 3000 Fellows, all specialists in the 54 specialties, the Academy is in a good position to help the authorities to shape the healthy care of tomorrow.

Through the concerted efforts of our Fellows and the expertise of the various Colleges, the Academy has been submitting various quality proposals to Government. These are—issues of Health Care Reform, policies on genetically modified foods and their labelling and the scientific basis on the need for more rigid tightening of tobacco control. We will continue to do so.

As an institute of postgraduate medical and dental education, the Academy is for all registered doctors and dentists, Fellows and non-Fellows alike. Similarly neither doctor nor dentist should be denied the right in their quest for professional excellence and to achieve Fellowship status if they so desired. Discussions are being conducted with the various Colleges to reintroduce remedial training programmes tailored to individual needs, in the hope that given time those with the ambition will become Fellows of the Academy.

2001 sees Hong Kong in the worse of time, much as part of the global economic recession. It may well be the best of the time for the healthy care profession to push for the highest possible standard of healthy care, shape the health policy of tomorrow, have our population healthy, to be prepared to face a new challenge as the world emerge from the doom and gloom!

COUNCIL AND COMMITTEES' REPORTS

Council

The Council is chaired by the Academy's President and consists as ex officio members the Vice-President (General Affairs), Vice-President (Education and Examinations), Honorary Secretary, Honorary Treasurer, Editor, Immediate Past President, and the fifteen Presidents of the constituent Colleges. There are also four Fellows sitting as elected members and one as co-opted member.

The Council is the body that manages Academy affairs and has the final authority in decision making. Various boards and committees have been set up over the years to handle specific duties for the Council and make recommendations when required. This year, new committees and working groups have been formed to handle the increasing workload of the Council. Below is a list of all the boards and committees dealing with various Academy affairs.

The Council and its committees are served by the Secretariat, headed by the General Secretary, and consisted 5 executives, 6 supporting staff and 2 workmen.

The Council held a total of 12 meetings between September 2000 and August 2001 to discuss and approve matters like admitting new Fellows, recommending Fellows to the Medical Council for specialist registration, endorsing Colleges' training guidelines/programmes/exams etc. At the same time, policies determining the directions of the Academy were also discussed.

The Second International Congress, titled "Medical advances and information in the new millennium", was held at the Academy from 2 to 5 November 2000.

Mrs. Anson Chan, the then Chief Secretary for Administration, was the Council's Guest of Honour at the Opening Ceremony. Mrs. Chan also delivered the David Todd Oration, titled "Hong Kong: Cycles of Change".

During the ceremony, Dr. James Kung and Mrs. Cecilia Lee were awarded by Council for their invaluable contributions to the Academy over the years. Dr. Kung who received an Academy Medal, has been Chairman of the HKAM Foundation Fund's Fund Management Committee since 1993 and the Finance and Investment Committee since 1998. Mrs. Lee received an Award for Distinguished Contributions. She has served the Joint Building Committee and House Committee since 1997.

The 4-day congress was well attended by over 600 delegates from Hong Kong and overseas. More than 140 speakers participated in 12 plenary lectures and 26 symposia.

The Seventh Annual General Meeting was held on 14 December 2000. Invited to officiate the ceremony with the Council were Prof. Zong Shu-jie (Vice-President and Secretary General, Chinese Medical Association), Prof. Cao Ze-yi (Executive Vice-President, Chinese Medical Association), Dr. William Ho (Chief Executive, Hospital Authority), Dr. Lee Kin-hung (Chairman, Medical Council of Hong Kong), Dr. Jeffrey Tsang (Chairman, Dental Council of Hong Kong), and Dr. the Hon. Lo Wing-lok of the Legislative Council.

During the AGM, the results of the election of Officers were announced. Dr. CH Leong was elected the new President, Prof. Joseph Sung – Vice-President (General Affairs), Prof. Grace Tang – Vice-President (Education and Examinations), Dr. KW Chu – Honorary Secretary, Dr. Pamela Leung – Honorary Treasurer, Dr. YL Yu – Editor.

A Plaque of Appreciation was presented to Prof. Joseph Lee for his input and contribution as Editor on an honorary basis since 1992.

Prof. Allan Chang was presented an Academy Medal for his services as Vice-President (Education and Examinations) from 1996 to 2000 and his invaluable contribution in the development and implementation of policies related to training and CME.

In the presence of friends and relatives, newly admitted Fellows were conferred individually by the Academy President at the Conferment Ceremony, held in conjunction with the AGM. A total of 248 Fellows were admitted in person or in absentia that evening.

An Extraordinary General Meeting was held on 17 May 2001 to admit a second batch of 98 new Fellows nominated by 13 Academy Colleges.

A Special Council meeting was organised on 2 January 2001. The then Acting Secretary for Health and Welfare, Mr. Gregory Leung, discussed the Consultation Document on Health Care Reform with Council members on behalf of the Secretary for Health and Welfare. The Secretary for Health and Welfare himself later attended the Academy's Open Forum on 7 March 2001 to listen to Fellows' views and answer queries concerning the Government's proposals.

Besides Health Care Reform, Council members have also deliberated on issues that are concerned with the standards of health care or related to professional issues:

- Medical Council Reform
- Membership of the Medical Council's Education and Accreditation Committee
- CME Programme for Practising Doctors who are not registered with the CME Programmes for Specialists
- Accreditation System for Private Hospitals
- Clinical Guidelines on the Prevention of Perinatal HIV Transmission
- Government's Proposals on the Labelling of Genetically Modified Food
- Government's Proposals on Tobacco Control

The Council has expressed its formal views or made appropriate responses on behalf of the Academy on most of these issues after seeking Fellows' comments.

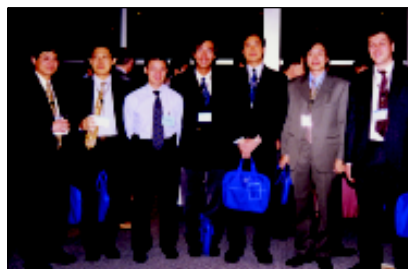

Appeals Committee

The Regulations require that a mechanism must be provided by the Academy to allow for appeals when admissions are denied.

The Appeals Committee was originally formed to handle appeals relating to Fellowship admission and it comprised appointed members from the Academy Council. Following the establishment of the Specialist Register by the Medical Council of Hong Kong, the Academy also received appeals from doctors relating to certification for specialist registration as the Academy is responsible for vetting whether an applicant (who is not an Academy Fellow) has qualifications, training and CME that are comparable to that required of an Academy Fellow. In this regard, Council decided to revise the terms of reference of the Committee so that it can also consider all appeals relating to certification for specialist registration in addition to admissions to the Academy.

The composition of the Committee has been revamped. The Chairman of the Committee is appointed by Council. An Appeals Panel consisting previous Council members, who are familiar with the Academy's rules and regulations, has been set up. Four members from the panel will be invited every time to make up an ad hoc Appeals Committee on a

rota basis. The specialty of the appellant and the specialties to which the voting members belong to would be taken into account.

To avoid conflict of interest, the President, the 2 Vice-Presidents and the Honorary Secretary have ceased to serve the Committee as non-voting members. They would now participate in the discussion of an appeal at the Council level only - after the case has been considered by the Appeals Committee.

Between September 2000 and August 2001, the Committee has held one meeting to discuss the case of a doctor whose certification for specialist registration to the Medical Council was not supported by the Academy, as recommended by the relevant College.

The Appeals Committee was requested to look at the case afresh. After going through the details with due care and considering the points made by both the appellant and the College, the Committee decided that the standard of the appellant's training and qualifications is broadly comparable to what is required from an Academy Fellow and could be recommended for the purpose of specialist registration. The resolution was supported and endorsed by Council after lengthy discussions.

Conference Committee

The Conference Committee has been recently set up in mid 2001 to promote conferences at the Academy. It is chaired by the Vice-President (General Affairs). Each College has a nominated representative sitting on the Committee.

The Committee will look after Academy projects and organize scientific meetings on a regular basis. It will explore the idea of organizing intercollegiate functions for target audiences, besides acting as the Organizing Committee when the Academy hosts its own conferences.

The Committee has decided that the 2002 Annual Joint Scientific Conference will be held in November 2002 at the Academy building. The main theme of the Congress is “Minimal Invasive Therapy”.

By the time this Annual Report appears in print, the work of the Conference Committee will be in full swing. Details of the conference will be updated at the Academy’s website periodically.

The Committee will put strong efforts in promoting the Academy facilities to medical conference

organizers and Fellows, while the Conference Secretariat will provide full support to all conferences.

This year, our Conference Secretariat will be providing secretariat support for 4 major conferences, viz:

- Challenges and Opportunities in Pathology (October 4-7, 2001 at Hong Kong Academy of Medicine)
- 6th Asia Pacific Conference on Tobacco or Health (October 26-29, 2001 at Hospital Authority Headquarters’ Building)
- Joint Scientific Meeting - Infectious Diseases and Ambulatory Medicine (October 27-28, 2001 at Hong Kong Academy of Medicine)
- 3rd Echo Hong Kong (November 24-25, 2001 at Ruttonjee Hospital and Sheraton Hong Kong Hotel & Towers)

With the efforts provided by the Committee and the Secretariat, we hope Fellows would continue to give their support by attending the conferences and using the facilities of the Academy building more frequently.

Constitutions Committee

The Constitutions Committee is a new committee established by Council in 2001. The Vice-President (General Affairs) was appointed its Chairman and the membership comprised the President, Immediate Past President, Honorary Secretary, Honorary Treasurer as well as two Council members.

The Committee’s main responsibility is to review the Academy’s constitutions from time to time and to propose necessary amendments to Council for its consideration.

The Committee has so far identified 15 areas in the constitutions that require review and discussions.

These include the existing membership of “Fellows”, “Members” and “Associates”; the admission of Associates; the requirement of admitting members by a general meeting, double entrance fees for double Fellowship. The proposed amendments have been passed gradually to Council for consideration.

The Committee aims to complete the whole reviewing and amendment exercise within 2 years. Once approved, Council will circulate the proposed amendments to Fellows for endorsement by postal ballot before passing them to the Legislative Council.

Editorial Board (Hong Kong Medical Journal)

The *Hong Kong Medical Journal* (HKMJ) is a joint publication of the Hong Kong Academy of Medicine and the Hong Kong Medical Association. It is indexed in MEDLINE / *Index Medicus* and EMBASE, and published quarterly with a circulation of 7,300 copies. It caters for both general and specialist interests.

Editorial Board

The Editorial Board is headed by Dr. YL Yu (Editor), who is assisted by Prof Richard Kay (Deputy Editor), Prof. PT Cheung (Associate Editor), Prof. Ignatius Yu (Associate Editor) and other members, as well as the International Advisory Board.

In March 2001, Ms. Yvonne Kwok was appointed Managing Editor to take over duties from Dr. Trevor Lane, who left to pursue his career in the United States.

Manuscripts statistics

In 2000, the Editorial Office received 126 manuscripts, of which 23 manuscripts were invited. The overall rejection rate was 37% and the acceptance rate for unsolicited manuscripts was 47%.

Publishing contract

A 2-year publishing contract (starting from July 2001) has been awarded to Scientific Communications (HK) Ltd.

Journal Design

To enhance readability, the cover and layout have been re-designed for the 2001 issues. Chinese translation of all paper abstracts has been introduced to facilitate communication with the huge Chinese-speaking population in the region.



Outreach

The first press briefing, held in August 2001, was well received by the public. The press briefings are based on the articles published in the HKMJ, with the aim of enhancing awareness of and knowledge in health and disease within the community.

To promote HKMJ amongst medical professionals in the Asia region, free sample copies of the HKMJ were sent to major medical institutions in Mainland China and other countries of the region.

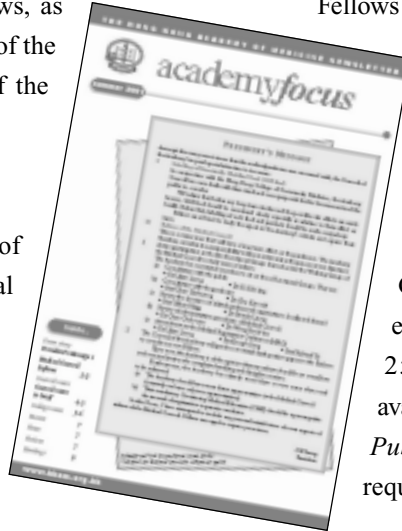

The *academyfocus* is the newsletter of the Hong Kong Academy of Medicine. Since it was first published in November 1995, it has served as a forum for exchange amongst Academy Fellows, as well as a means of informing them of the latest news and announcements of the Academy and its Colleges.

The columns in each issue include:

- *Cover Story* featuring issues of interest or concern to the medical profession
- *Council News* highlighting important events and announcements of the Council



- *College News* keeping Fellows posted of the latest information of their College
- *Events and Meetings* acting as a planner for Fellows

Education Committee

Prof. Allan Chang stepped down as Vice-President (Education & Examinations) at the last AGM. The Academy would like to thank him for his invaluable leadership and contributions in the past years. Prof. Grace Tang was elected new Vice-President (Education & Examinations) in December 2000 and became the new Chairman of the Education Committee by virtue of her vice-presidency.

Certification for Specialist Registration

According to the law, a doctor who wishes to have his name included in the Specialist Register will need to be a Fellow of the Academy or certified by the Academy to have qualification and training comparable to that required of an Academy Fellow. The Committee considered 6 applications from November 2000 to September 2001, and 4 applicants were considered comparable.

Continuing Medical Education

The Academy was one of the organisations invited by the Medical Council to organise CME programme

for doctors who were not taking CME programmes for specialists. A CME Sub-committee, chaired by Dr. CT Hung, was set up under the Education Committee to discuss the details. Members included Dr. FL Chan, Dr. Stephen YK Ho, Dr. SF Hung, Prof. KN Lai, Prof. Joseph WY Lau, and Prof. Grace Tang (ex-officio). The CME Programme recommended to and endorsed by Council was a package including a mixture of dedicated and non-dedicated programmes. The Academy through its Colleges would organize tailor-made CME activities (dedicated programme) and would open up their annual scientific meetings/ selected CME activities (non-dedicated programme) for registrants of this CME Programme.

Council believed that the Academy and its Colleges had the necessary expertise and the experience in running CME programmes covering various topics to suit doctors' needs, and that the CME Programme proposed to the Medical Council would be of high quality and standard.

New Specialties

The Committee recommended and Council approved 6 new specialties/sub-specialties during the year. The total number of specialties under the Academy has been increased from 48 to 54 (including 6 dentistry specialties).

Policy Review

During the year, the Committee reviewed the existing procedures in Specialists CME reporting by Colleges, and established a new system to streamline the whole process. The policy on assessment of certification

for specialist registration was discussed again to ensure that requirements of different Colleges could be met. The Committee also designed and adopted a standard format for reporting of Annual Return of Training Centre Manpower.

Prize for Best Original Research by Trainees

The prize aimed to recognise excellence in research performed by trainees. Three prizes (Gold, Silver and Bronze) would be awarded annually. The Academy would only award the prize to those research programmes with merit, and thus reserved the right not to award the prize in any given year.

Prof. Tony Chung was appointed Chairman of the Panel of Judges. Members of the panel include Dr. CW Kam, Prof. Raymond Liang, Prof. KS Leung, Prof. CM Lo and Prof. Grace Tang (ex-officio). The first prize would be awarded in December 2001. A total of 41 submissions were received and being assessed at the writing of this report.

Finance and Investment Committee

Due to his busy personal commitment, Dr. James Kung decided to step down from chairmanship of the Committee in October 2000. We would like to take this opportunity to thank Dr. Kung for his leadership and contributions to the Academy in the past years. Mr. MB Lee, who is a senior professional accountant, was appointed to chair the Committee upon Dr. Kung's resignation.

Since its restructuring in 1999, the Committee has been looking after finance for both the Academy and the Academy Foundation Fund. Over the past years, the Academy and the Foundation Fund has been

accumulating funds, which were put in fixed bank deposits. Earlier this year, the Committee recommended to the Academy Council and the Executive Board of the Foundation Fund that a portion of the fund should be put to direct investment in stocks and bonds as long-term investments. This was accepted and the Foundation Fund has allocated a fund for investments in blue chip stocks and selected bonds that are felt to be secure and of good interest return. The Committee continues to meet regularly to look after the finance and investment of both the Academy and the Foundation Fund.

House Committee

The building management contract expired during the year. The Committee considered appointing a company that could provide integrated facilities management to the Academy instead of having separate companies handling different services. After the tendering process, the existing Building Manager, Jones Land LaSalle was awarded a new contract, but they would oversee all facilities management including estate management, house keeping for the guestrooms and banqueting facilities. This re-arrangement resulted in cost savings to the Academy due to the more efficient pooling and management of resources. The Committee also successfully negotiated for addition of new kitchen equipment (at no cost from the Academy) for the new contract.

With the effort of a senior Fellow, a donation was obtained for the renovation on the 3/F of the building, which would include a library, a member's lounge and a small gymnasium. The Committee would work closely with the architect to produce a warm place where Fellows could meet, chat and relax when they drop by.

To provide better services to Fellows by making use of the IT development, the Committee joined hands with the IT Committee and Education Committee in the development of a Membership & Learning

Management System (MLMS). The MLMS would include on-line CME from which Fellows could take certain CME activities at their convenient time via the Internet. Features of this system also included automatic update of CME records, on-line checking of individual CME profile, and use of smart card for attendance record.

Three years after its grand opening, the HKAM Jockey Club Building has become more popular and the usage rate is climbing steadily. Other than international conferences and scientific seminars, Fellows' private functions like wedding parties and dinners have been held in the building occasionally.

To better cope with the needs of different users of the Building, a portable wheelchair lift was acquired; the toilets for the disabled on G/F, 1/F, and 2/F were equipped with folding handrails and emergency call system. Braille plates would also be added in the three lift cars.

The Committee would like to take this opportunity to thank Dr. David Fang and Dr. Paul Ko, who were unable to continue their service with the Committee due to busy commitments, for their contributions and invaluable advice in the past years.

Information Technology Committee

As reported last year, the Academy has developed an international network for CME and CPD (CMECPD.org). Phase 1 of the project was completed and the website has been up since November 2000. The website currently provides information mainly on a CME/CPD calendar. A Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) on the Intercollegiate Network has been signed with 9 overseas Academies and Colleges. These Academies/

Colleges are: Academy of Medicine, Singapore; Academy of Medicine of Malaysia; The Royal Australasian College of Physicians; The Royal College of Physicians & Surgeons of Canada; The Royal College of Physicians & Surgeons of Glasgow; Royal College of Physicians of London; Royal Australasian College of Surgeons; Royal College of Physicians of Thailand; and West African College of Physicians.

The Council recently resolved to establish a Membership & Learning Management System (a web-based system aiming to provide members with access of e-Learning, online membership and CME profiles via the Internet). The Committee is keen of integrating the CMECPD.org with this new system and the Academy's existing website.

The diploma course in Medical Informatics (DMI), offered by the Royal College of Surgeons of Edinburgh in partnership with the Hong Kong Academy of Medicine, started last year. A 2-day programme was held in Hong Kong (at the Academy Building) on 30 September and 1 October 2000. Sixteen students attended this residential programme in Hong Kong. The Committee will further promote our conjoint DMI in Hong Kong and Mainland China.

The Committee is aware that the Government has earmarked a budget to develop a Healthcare Information Infrastructure (HII) to be used by both the public and private sectors. The main objectives of the project are (a) to allow sharing of healthcare information among healthcare service providers, healthcare professionals and the public, and (b) to improve the quality of healthcare in Hong Kong via efficient and effective health information networking. The project will have significant implications on the delivery of high quality healthcare services in Hong Kong. The Committee is actively exploring ways to develop a common format of hospital patients' discharge summary to be adopted by HA and private hospitals in order to facilitate efficient storage and transfer of patient data. This is a first-step towards using IT to promote the integration of healthcare across sectional barriers.

Membership Committee

The Committee is responsible for vetting nominations for Academy Fellowship submitted by Colleges. In the past, the Committee vetted nominations twice a year before submission to Council for approval. Since last year, the nominations were vetted and approved by Council as frequently as necessary. This is beneficial to new Fellows who might need the Fellowship status urgently for promotion or other purposes. According to the constitutions, successful nominations approved by Council must still be endorsed at a general meeting.

From September 2000 to December 2000, 121 nominations from 12 Colleges were received and vetted by the Committee. 120 of them were endorsed

by Council and approved at the Annual General Meeting on 14 December 2000. The remaining nomination required some clarifications and had to be deferred. A conferment ceremony was held on the same day of the AGM to formally admit the new Fellows to the Academy.

From January to May 2001, 97 nominations for Fellowship were considered by the Committee. All these, plus the one deferred from December, were endorsed by Council and subsequently passed at the Extraordinary General Meeting on 17 May 2001. These new Fellows, will be formally conferred on the day of the coming AGM in December.

Nominations Committee For Awards and Appointment of Honorary Advisors

The Committee is chaired by the President and consist of 5 Council members. It was formally set up in November 1999 to consider persons suitable for awards for outstanding services to the Academy or appointment as honorary advisors. The criteria for eligibility and restrictions have been established by Council.

At the time of writing, several nominations have been received by the Academy. The Nominations Committee will meet to go over the nominations in detail and make recommendations to the Council for endorsement. The results will be announced at the coming AGM and the awards will be presented by the President.

Election of Council Members

Pursuant to the HKAM Ordinance, an election is being conducted for five elected Council members. The notice of the election and a nomination form were sent to all Fellows on 29 June 2001. The following

nominations were received by the deadline of 3 September 2001. The postal ballot will begin in mid-October and the results will be announced at the AGM on 14 December 2001.

HONORARY TREASURER'S REPORT

Fellows will find from the financial statements that the Academy has returned to a surplus this year, despite we recorded a deficit the year before. This was due to the efforts of both the Finance Committee and House Committee. Both Committees have tried their best in finding ways to improve income and control cost.

It must be pointed out that part of the \$4.1M surplus this year was derived from a write-back of overprovision (\$2.7M) for the construction cost of the Academy building - thanks to the former Building Committee for their hard work in making savings from the original budget.

As indicated in the President's message to Fellows in September, the Academy will improve its infrastructures to facilitate our Fellows on their paths to life long learning and to provide better environment in the Academy, conducive of continuous learning and a congenial atmosphere for the development of brotherhood. To this end, the Academy has decided to develop an e-Learning system, and to construct a

library, a gymnasium, and a lounge on the 3/F of the Academy building. While the Academy has already obtained donations for the construction cost and gymnasium equipment, the Academy will have to spare extra annual budget for the maintenance of these facilities. Nevertheless, the Academy Council felt it worthwhile doing so.

The Conference Department has been keeping up its good work and started to generate income for the Academy. We hope Fellows will keep on supporting the Academy by using more the facilities provided by the Academy.

NOTES ON THE ACCOUNTS

(Expressed in Hong Kong dollars)

1 Status of the Academy

The Academy was established as a body corporate under the Hong Kong Academy of Medicine Ordinance on 1 August 1992. The principal activities of the Academy are to promote and advance the science of medicine by education and exchange of information as well as to improve the standard of local health care.

2 Significant accounting policies

(a) Statement of compliance

These accounts have been prepared in accordance with all applicable Statements of Standard Accounting Practice and Interpretations issued by the Hong Kong Society of Accountants and accounting principles generally accepted in Hong Kong. A summary of the significant accounting policies adopted by the Academy is set out below.

(b) Basic of preparation of the accounts

The measurement basis used in the preparation of the accounts is historical cost modified by the marking to market of certain investment in securities as explained in the accounting policies set out below.

(c) Depreciation

Fixed assets are stated in the balance sheet at cost less accumulated depreciation. Depreciation is calculated to write off the cost of fixed assets over their estimated useful lives on a straight-line basis at a rate of 20% per annum.

(d) Headquarters development/Headquarters development fund

Donations, grants, contributions and funds received for the headquarters development are credited to the headquarters development fund.

Costs of constructing the headquarters are written off against the headquarters development fund. Any surplus on the headquarters development fund is carried forward to set off future expenditure of the development; any deficit on the headquarters development fund is carried forward and included under "Debtors, deposits and prepayments", if it is assured with reasonable certainty that such deficit will be made good by future donations, grants and contributions towards the development.

(e) Stocks

Stocks are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value. Net realisable value is determined by reference to the sales proceeds of items sold in the ordinary course of business subsequent to the balance sheet date.

2 Significant accounting policies (continued)

(f) *Investment in securities*

Non-trading securities are stated in the balance sheet at fair value. Changes in fair value are recognised in the investment revaluation reserve until the security is sold, collected, or otherwise disposed of, or until there is objective evidence that the security is impaired, at which time the relevant cumulative gain or loss is transferred from the investment revaluation reserve to the profit and loss account.

(g) *Revenue recognition*

(i) Entrance fees and subscription fees

Entrance fees are recognised when the cash is received. Subscription fees are recognised on an accruals basis.

(ii) Donations, grants and contributions

Donations, grants and contributions are recognised in the accounts when the Academy is reasonably assured that such amount will be received.

(iii) Income from international congress and various functions

Income from international congress and various functions is recognised on an accruals basis.

(iv) Management fee

Management fee income is recognised on an accruals basis.

(v) Interest income

Interest income from bank deposits is accrued on a time-apportioned basis on the principal outstanding and at the rate applicable.

(vi) Dividends

Dividend income from listed investments is recognised when the share price of the investment goes ex-dividend.

(h) *Related parties*

For the purposes of the accounts, parties are considered to be related to the Academy if the Academy has the ability, directly or indirectly, to control the party or exercise significant influence over the party in making financial and operating decisions, or vice versa, or where the Academy and the party are subject to common control or common significant influence. Related parties may be individuals or entities.

(i) *Cash equivalents*

Cash equivalents are short-term, highly liquid investments which are readily convertible into known amounts of cash without notice and which were within three months of maturity when acquired.

The construction of the headquarters of the Academy were substantially completed in 1998. The headquarters development cost was financed by donations, grants and contributions from the Hong Kong SAR Government, the Hong Kong Jockey Club Charities Trust, the Foundation Fund and the Hong Kong Medical Council.

All donations from the Hong Kong Jockey Club Charities Trust for the headquarters development are paid firstly to the Foundation Fund. Grants are then made by the Foundation Fund to the Academy out of the donations received for payments of the development costs. Contributions and grants received by the Academy during the year amounted to \$Nil (1999: \$37,558,788).

Based on the latest cost of the construction work, there was an overprovision for costs of \$2,677,260. This amount has been credited to the income and expenditure account.

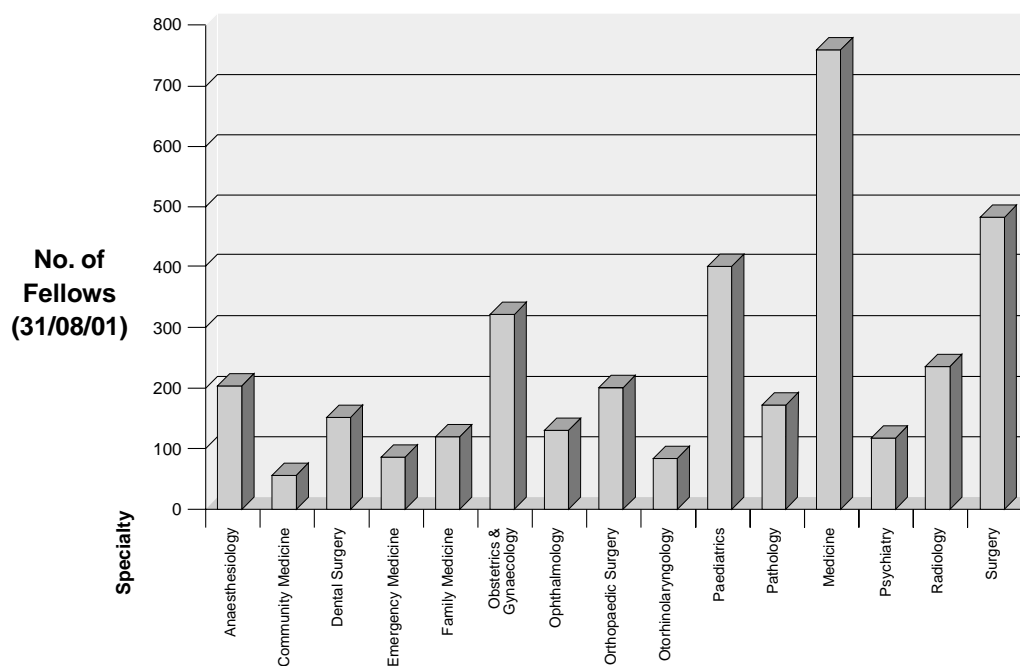
