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WELCOME MESSAGE

PROF. GILBERTO KA-KIT LEUNG PRESIDENT, HONG KONG ACADEMY OF MEDICINE

Dear Fellows and colleagues,

The Academy's 30th anniversary celebrations concluded with the annual conferment ceremony, David Todd Oration, and gala dinner, graced by the presence of Chief Executive John Lee Ka-chiu and Vice-minister of the National Health Commission (NHC) Yu Xuejun.

During the ceremony, Mr. Lee expressed deep appreciation for the Academy's unwavering dedication over the past three decades. Our statutory role has enabled our practitioners to deliver high-quality care through various specialist training, curricula and CPD programmes. From manpower planning and specialist training to uplifting the overall professional qualities of our healthcare services, the Academy's contribution is essential to the success of the healthcare system within our community. Mr. Yu acknowledged the Academy's collaboration with the NHC in standardising training and supporting medical education in the mainland, in particular our participation in the establishment of the Shenzhen-Hong Kong Medical Specialist Training Centre in 2019 to pilot specialist physician training aligned with the national policies and regional needs.



We also welcomed new Fellows and presented awards to BORT, BOPA, and BORYF winners in the ceremony. Details of the event and awards can be found on the <u>Academy website</u>. We also encourage you to visit our <u>HKAM30A website</u> and explore the exciting past events and activities.

Following the Tripartite Medical Education Conference held in conjunction with HKU and CUHK in early 2023, the Academy, the two medical schools, and the Hospital Authority signed a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) in November. The MOU aims to improve the entire medical training process, from medical school admissions to undergraduate studies, postgraduate training, and independent clinical practice. The MOU includes a collective commitment to the organisation of regular Quadripartite Medical Education Conferences, and points towards the establishment of an informal platform for future exchanges and collaborations.



There are other exciting initiatives on the horizon. As the Hong Kong Jockey Club Innovative Learning Centre for Medicine (ILCM) has just celebrated its 10th birthday in December, we plan to enhance medical training by revamping the ILCM, with hopes of continued support from the Hong Kong Jockey Club for incorporating advanced educational and healthcare technologies. We have already launched four specialist training programmes to integrate with the 3-year postgraduate training in Shenzhen; more are anticipated in the coming years. We have also expanded our taskforce to enhance ethics and professionalism, and shall explore new areas including advanced directives, AI in healthcare, and addressing climate change's impact on healthcare.

Lastly, the Academy remains committed to promoting our Fellows' wellbeing, both physical and mental. We shall devise plans to assist senior Fellows in coping with challenges that inevitably come with advanced age to ensure that they can continue to provide much valued clinical services and enjoy a fulfilling career.

FEATURE ARTICLE: THROUGH THE LOOKING GLASS

Dr. Arthur van Langenberg, a seasoned surgeon with over five decades of practice, has transitioned to exploring his passions for gardening and writing these years. In this article, he reveals how gardening brought solace, his involvement in a terrace project within the Academy building, and the concept behind selecting the commemorative tree for the Academy.

Approaching, in 2021, the end of a long medical practice (Class of 1962), there were many things to consider. Had I reached my sell-by date? If not yet, then it was surely fast approaching! Retirement loomed large. Granted the drama and excitement of an eventful surgical career may awaken wistful recollections, but it surely should not be a deadweight to carry around.

General Douglas MacArthur, in his retirement speech, famously said: "Old soldiers never die, they just fade away." I take issue with that sentiment. I would parse it thus: "Old surgeons never die, nor do they just fade away." Retirement is not an end in itself, rather, it opens doors to new opportunities.

In my case, gardening has been my salvation—or rather should I say it has been my salvation ever since it became my passion several decades ago. In our bustling metropolis, there is an inevitable disconnect between its citizens and Nature. Gardening aims to correct this through reconnection. In many ways gardening is a solitary activity, a covenant between oneself and one's plants. After a hard day's work, I would immerse myself in my garden surrounded by and communicating with my charges, my equanimity restored. Any observer surveying this scene and hearing me talking to my plants might reasonably surmise that this gardener is undoubtably mad! In medicine and gardening, analogies abound. Yes, we sometimes act strangely, but patience is key.

Anticipation, immediate action, the ability to change tack if problems arise—all of these apply, including expecting the unexpected.

The universe is a community; its harmony is my harmony. Those who do not recognise this are strangers to the universe. Ever since the emergence of *Homo sapiens*, modern humans have supplanted Nature as the dominant environmental force on Earth. Consequently, we bear responsibility for the planet. This is why I find encouragement when approached by anyone seeking guidance to embark on their gardening journey.

There have been many. Two years ago, a group of doctors, mostly in mid or later career, expressed their desire to cultivate vegetables on the large terrace located on the third floor of the Academy building. I was eager to help since growing food is a special interest of





mine and besides, I have always considered it important for someone in a stressful occupation to be able to pursue new interests. However, upon inspecting the terrace, I must admit that I had some reservations. The terrace, although large, was fairly exposed to wind and faced westward, making it susceptible to intense heat in the summertime, especially heat reflected from the tiled flooring. But—nothing ventured, nothing gained. We embarked on the project, with valuable input from Dr. Tom Ho, a dentist and a seasoned gardener. Large containers, topsoil, peat moss, organic fertilisers were quickly set up and doctors or specialty colleges assumed cultivation of individual containers. Despite my initial concerns, we were pleasantly surprised by the rapid success, with a harvest of various vegetables, herbs, and fruits. I still pay occasional visits to the terrace to see how things are progressing.

Recently, a small group of my former students from the 1970s sought my help and I shall be visiting their small start-up farm on Lamma Island to get things going. A week ago, two young doctors (Classes of 2020, 2021), having read of my concern for environmental issues came to visit me through the auspices of a mutual friend. We had a wide-ranging and lively discussion (despite having both been on call the previous night), hardly noticing the yawning age gap. So important it is to engage the younger generation. Gardening also gives us greater respect for food—a cabbage is not merely an item we pick up from the supermarket wrapped in plastic, in exchange for a few dollars. A potato originates from beneath the soil, requiring us to dig it up, often covered with mud. Many people have never seen it in that raw, unprocessed form.

A digression. Would it not be wonderful if we had a machine that removed carbon from the air using solar energy and producing beautiful, workable building material? But wait! We do have such a machine. It's called a TREE. To commemorate the Academy's 30th anniversary, it was decided to plant a tree in the garden to mark this milestone. I was tasked with suggesting a suitable specimen for this purpose. I chose Ficus religiosa (菩提樹) (bodhi tree, peepul tree) for its significance in Buddhism. At his death around 400 BCE, the Buddha or Siddhartha Gautama is said to have achieved parinirvana or enlightenment whilst sitting under such a tree. Hence, it is also known as the "tree of enlightenment". Should anyone in the Academy be confronted with a particularly thorny dilemma, then my suggestion is for that someone to stand in the shade of the Academy tree and wait for light to be shone on the problem.
