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

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Dear Fellows and colleagues,

Over the past few months, I have had the opportunity to engage with key external stakeholders through several notable activities. These included welcoming the Shanghai Municipal Health Commission during their visit to the Academy, delivering plenary lectures at the Hospital Authority Convention, and representing the Academy at the Royal Australasian College of Surgeons (RACS) Annual Scientific Congress. Looking ahead, the Academy is co-organising the celebration of 中國醫師節 in August with other local medical institutions, while the anniversary of the founding of the People's Republic of China will be commemorated in September.

Registration is now open for the Medical Education Conference (MEC) 2025, which will take place on 27 September. Organised by the Academy and supported by leading institutions, MEC 2025 will explore the theme "Technologies in Medical Education: Al and Beyond". The conference will feature renowned speakers and four expert-led sessions covering Al and language models, simulation and human-technology interaction, as well as digital innovations. It offers a valuable platform for advancing medical education and fostering cross-border collaboration among healthcare professionals.

A fruitful first meeting of the Task Force on Organ Donation was held on 12 May. The meeting included a review of global and local organ donation trends, an introduction to the Task Force's composition, and a discussion of proposed initiatives and work plans. To take the work forward, several task groups were formed to design frameworks for integrating organ

donation into specialist training curricula; develop promotional strategies targeting the public through social media campaigns, community events, and school-based education; and draft a position statement on education and training in organ donation.

Congratulations to the new-term Council of the Young Fellows Chapter, commencing in July. I am confident they will continue to uphold and strengthen the Chapter's meaningful work. In parallel, the Academy has consistently focused on Fellows' well-being. On 27 June, the Task Force on Well-being hosted a workshop featuring Dr. Carrie Horwitch, an expert from the United States known for advocating the healing power of laughter to enhance physical and mental health.

A revision of the Best Practice Guidelines for Expert Witnesses by the Academy's Professional and Ethics Committee is currently underway and is expected to be released in the second half of the year. The updated guidelines aim to reflect the latest developments and feedback in the field, offering clearer and up-to-date guidance for medical professionals serving as expert witnesses in disciplinary and legal proceedings.

The Hong Kong Medical Journal has maintained its solid performance with a journal impact factor of 2.6 in 2024, remaining in Quartile 1 of the Journal Citation Report's Medicine, General and Internal category. I sincerely thank our editors, reviewers, and authors for their dedication, and our readers for their continued support.

JOCKEY CLUB INSTITUTE FOR MEDICAL EDUCATION AND DEVELOPMENT

Clinical Negligence Update Webinar: Key Insights and Implications for Hong Kong Healthcare Professionals

The Hong Kong Academy of Medicine hosted a webinar on 29 May 2025, titled "Clinical Negligence Update—An Update in UK Case Law and Expert Evidence." The event was jointly organised by the Task Force on Laws for Healthcare Practitioners under the Academy's Professionalism and Ethics Committee and the Academy's Jockey Club Institute for Medical Education and Development (JCIMED), with support from Kennedys.

The keynote speaker was Mr. Christopher Malla, Head of the Healthcare Division and Partner at Kennedys. Dr. James Chiu, Convenor of the Task Force, opened the event, while Professor Gilberto Leung, Immediate Past President, moderated the session.

Mr. Malla's presentation covered key areas in clinical negligence, including the legal landscape on informed consent following Montgomery v Lanarkshire Health Board [2015], the impact of artificial intelligence on healthcare delivery, and recent court decisions involving medical expert witnesses. He also discussed a Supreme Court judgement on liability for psychiatric injury and new patient safety initiatives in England, such as Martha's Rule for urgent patient reviews.

A lively Q&A session followed, with attendees engaging the speakers. The panel included Mr. Malla, Ms. Christine Tsang, Ms. Sandy Cho, both Partners at Kennedys, and Dr. James Chiu, offering diverse perspectives on the complex issues discussed.

While the webinar focused on UK case law, the insights shared are relevant to healthcare practitioners in Hong Kong. Understanding international legal trends in clinical negligence is crucial for upholding patient care standards and professional ethics. The event emphasised the importance of clear communication with patients, staying informed about technological advancements, and understanding the legal implications of medical decision making.

This webinar exemplifies the Academy's commitment to ongoing professional development. By bringing international expertise to local healthcare professionals, such events enhance the quality of healthcare delivery and patient safety in Hong Kong. Navigating the Digital Landscape: Insights from the Medico-Legal Symposium on Social Media and Medical Promotion

On 7 June 2025, the Lim Por Yen Lecture Theatre at the Hong Kong Academy of Medicine Jockey Club Building hosted a symposium featuring insightful discussions and expert opinions. The event focused on the legal and ethical aspects of medical advertising and the use of social media, targeting medical practitioners and dentists. It provided a platform to explore the challenges and opportunities of navigating the digital landscape responsibly. The symposium was a joint initiative by the Academy's Young Fellows Chapter and the Jockey Club Institute for Medical Education and Development (JCIMED).

The day began with a warm welcome from Dr. Wing-cheong Leung, Honorary Secretary of the Academy, setting an engaging tone for the symposium. Professor Hung Chi Tim, JP, from The Jockey Club School of Public Health and Primary Care at The Chinese University of Hong Kong, opened with a session titled "Social Media for Medical Practitioners: Do We Know Our Boundaries?" His presentation highlighted the importance of understanding the limits and responsibilities when engaging with social media as healthcare professionals.

Following this, Ms. Chantel Pang, Of Counsel from the Healthcare Team at Kennedys, delivered a talk titled "Friend or Foe: Practice Promotion and Use of Social Media in Healthcare." She offered practical insights into how healthcare professionals can leverage social media for practice promotion while maintaining ethical standards.

The event also featured a lively panel discussion, during which participants engaged with the speakers, posing thoughtful questions and sharing experiences. The interactive session fostered meaningful dialogue and deeper exploration of the topics.

The symposium concluded with closing remarks that encapsulated the key takeaways, reinforcing the importance of continuous education and awareness in the digital age. Attendees left with a renewed understanding of how to uphold professional integrity while promoting their services effectively. 
